## An Idea

Some time ago, for purposes of a project, I was given an iPad at my work. Well, first thing I did was to load on it miscellaneous philatelic literature so I could read it on the train during my commute. Being a UPSS Member, I had all issues of their publication, Postal Stationery (PS). This gave me a chance to go through all their issues, looking for material of interest to me.

One thing I realized right away was that almost every one of the PS issues had one or several articles, notes, comments on EFOs (I actually made an index of those). I think that a similar observation would apply to most societies. In other words, almost any specialty would have an interest in EFOs.

I know that some EFOCC Members are also UPSS Members. But there are many more UPSS Members who are not EFOCC Members. I wonder whether we could run joint "marketing campaigns," where a cooperating society would agree to run targeted EFOCC advertisements (maybe with some special), and in return, the EFOCC would run in The EFO Collector similar advertisements for the other society.

I wonder if one of our Members would be willing to organize such a campaign for the EFOCC. If you are willing to do so or have ideas in this area, please do not hesitate to contact me.

The goal would be to work with a few societies at a time, perhaps 2 or 3 , and later expand if successful. Initially, I think a good special would be 2 -for-1, i.e. the new Member pays for one year and gets a 2 -year Membership. I will be personally willing to contribute to the EFOCC the equivalent of the lost dues under this program so that the EFOCC does not suffer financially.

Or perhaps, there could be a 2 -society Membership model, where for a fee (of presumably less than 2 individual memberships), an individual becomes Member in both societies.

There are also other ways Societies can cooperate. For example, each Society can, in its publication, list articles of interest in the publication of the other society. Another idea is that a Society provide complimentary access to the Members of the other society, on a mutual basis (Thinking of this, one of the special projects I have in mind is the creation of a Members' Area on the EFOCC website).

With the right frame of mind, this is an area where one could really push the envelope and set up a model on how Societies can cooperate to be more appealing to the collectors.

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## New Zealand Errors Part 4

## 2005 Farmyard Animals \$1.50

To welcome the Chinese New Year in 2005, New Zealand Post issued several stamps featuring farmyard animals. The $\$ 1.50$ value depicted the rooster. The rooster has been a symbol of courage since the Roman times and has even been featured on Asian coins.

The technical details are: Date of Issue: 12 January 2005; Stamp Designer: Samuel Sakaria, Watermark, Wellington; Lunar Illustrator: Lindy Fisher, Auckland; Gummed stamps: Southern Colour Print, New Zealand; Stamp Size: 40mm x 30 mm ; Sheet Size: 25 stamps per sheet plus one strip of five gutter images (labels); Paper Type: 104gsm red phosphor coated litho paper; Perforation: 14.

One major error was reported on this stamp:
A. Sheet inverted causing perforation error to middle rows ( $\$ 850$ for 1 strip of 5): The third row in the pane was vertically misperforated because the stamps were perforated in the reverse direction. Normally, a reversed sheet by itself would not cause misperforated stamps, however, the labels being narrower caused a vertical strip misperforated stamps. The vertical perforation appears in the middle of the third column of stamp and the right side of the stamps in the third column are missing the vertical perforation.

## 2008 Weather Extremes Farmyard Animals 50 ¢

Of the six stamps issued in 2008 depicting extreme weather, two had the value of $50 \phi$ : One depicted drought and the other depicted the high winds. The technical details are: Date of issue: 5 March 2008; Designed by: Vertigo Design, Wellington; Printer and Process: Southern Colour Print Ltd., by

offset lithography; Number of colours: Four process colours plus one special (PMS 876); Stamp Size and Format: gummed, $40 \mathrm{~mm} x 30 \mathrm{~mm}$ (vertical); Paper Type: Tullis Russell 104gsm red phosphor gum stamp paper; Number of Stamps per Sheet: 25; and Perforation: 14.

One major error was reported on the $50 \notin$ stamp depicting the wind:
A. Three colours (bronze, yellow \& magenta) omitted $(\$ 3,000)$ : As a result of the omitted colours the name of the country and value are missing.

## Christmas

## 3c Christmas 1970

The $3 \phi$ Christmas stamp issued in 1970 depicts a stained glass window from the First Presbyterian Church at Invercargill. The technical details are: Date of Issue: 1 October 1970; Designers: M. Cleverley, Auckland and D. Hatcher, Auckland; Printers: Thomas De La Rue, England; Stamp Size: 25.5 mm x 41 mm ; Sheet Size: 100 stamps per sheet; Process: Delacryl; Paper Type: Chalk surfaced, unwatermarked.

An interesting shift of the print was discovered on the stamp:
A. Olive colour displaced half stamp width to the right (\$275): As a result, the name of the country and the other text nearby is split between two stamps.


Text in olive color shifted to the right.

## 40c Christmas 1997 (Self-Adhesive)

To celebrate Christmas 1997, New Zealand Post issued seven stamps. Of the two of the stamps with a value of $40 \phi$, one depicted the music of "Te Harinui" and the other "Not on a snowy night... By star or candle light...". The technical details are: Date of Issue: 3 September 1997; Designer: Fifi Colston, Wellington; Printer: Southern Colour Print, New Zealand; Stamp Size: $40 \mathrm{~mm} \times 30 \mathrm{~mm}$; Self-adhesive: 30 mm x 25 mm ; Sheet Size: Sheets of 100; Booklets of ten stamps; Process: Lithography; Perforation Gauge: 14; Self-adhesive: Die cut; and Paper Type: Harrison and Sons; JAC self-adhesive - red phosphor coated, unwatermarked.

An interesting perforating variety was discovered on the $40 \phi$ stamp with the "Te Harinui" music:
A. Major perforation shift of stamp showing booklet info on left: In addition the horizontal perforation is also slightly shifted down.


## 40c Christmas 2003 (Self-Adhesive)

In 2003, New Zealand Post issued seven stamps to celebrate Christmas. Two of the stamps had a value $40 \phi$ with the design of the Baby Jesus. One had PVA gum as adhesive and the other was self-adhesive. The technical details are: Date of Issue: 1 October 2003; Designer: Lindy Fisher, Auckland; Printer: Cartor Security Printing, France; Stamp Size: 34 mm x 34 mm and 25 mm x 30 mm ; Sheet Size: 50 ; Process: Lithography; Perforation: 13.

A major error was reported on the $40 \phi$ self-adhesive stamp:
A. Black silver fern omitted $(\$ 3,500)$ at the right bottom of the stamp.


Note fern missing in lower stamp.

## Health

## 10c Health 1979

The two health stamps $(10 \phi+2 \phi)$ were se tenant depicting a demoiselle fish (Chromis dispilus) and a sea urchin (Diadema palmeri). Technical details are: Date of Issue: 25 July 1979; Designers: P. Blackie, Hobsonville and G. Fuller, Havelock North; Printers: Harrison and Sons, England; Stamp Size: 24.13 mm x 40.64 mm ; Sheet Size: 100 stamps per sheet; Process: Lithography; Perforation: $3.75 \times 13.25$ and $13.25 \times 13.75$; Paper Type: Harrison and Sons, unwatermarked.

A major error was reported on this stamp:
A. Green Colour Doubly Printed on sea urchin stamp (\$225).


## 24c Health 1984

The $24 \phi+2 \phi$ health stamp depicting the Shetland pony is one of the two stamps issued by New Zealand in 1984 as part of its yearly Health Stamps. Shetlands are one of the smallest and at the same time one of the strongest members of the equine world. The technical details are: Date of Issue: 1 August 1984; Designer: M Chapman, Christchurch; Printers: Harrison and Sons, England; Stamp Size: $42 \mathrm{~m} \times 25 \mathrm{~mm}$; Sheet Size: 100 stamps per sheet; Process: Lithography; Perforation: 14.25; Paper Type: Harrison and Sons, unwatermarked.

A major error was reported on this stamp:
A. Orange Colour Shift (\$250): The orange inscription depicting Shetland is shifted down at the bottom of stamp instead of being at the top.


Top stamp: Normal. Bottom stamp: orange shifted down.

## 40c Health 1996

In 1996, Health Stamps ( $40 \phi+5 \phi, 40 \phi+5 \phi$ [self-adhesive] and $80 \phi+5 \phi)$ were issued in sheet and miniature sheet and coil formats. The initial sheet stamps and miniature sheets were printed by Joh Enschedé, however, on receipt of the stamps, an error was noticed in the $40 \not \subset+5 \phi$ Children's Health Surcharge design. The sheet stamp was then reprinted by Southern Colour Print and the miniature sheets and self-adhesive stamp reprinted by Sprintpak-Australia Post. A small quantity of the
incorrectly designed stamp in both self-adhesive and sheet format were sold in error from at least two New Zealand Post Shops.

The major errors reported on this stamp were:
A. Teddy Bear in seat-belt $(\$ 2,500)$ : In other words, a teddy bear is shown in the error at the right top the value $40 \varnothing$ postage appears at the bottom. The normal copy does not depict a teddy bear and " $40 ¢$ POSTAGE" appears at the right top.
B. Teddy Bear in seat-belt (Self-Adhesive) $(\$ 5,000)$ : Error similar to " A " on the self-adhesive version of the stamp.

## Concluding Remarks

The errors described in this series of 4 articles cover both printing and perforating errors. They cover the most recent errors should add to the other errors on New Zealand stamps that I have described in my articles on New Zealand errors in The EFO Collector. I have also attempted to provide additional technical background to these errors. Hopefully, it should provide philatelists a little more data so as to enable them to guess how many errors are likely to exist. These descriptions will hopefully stimulate a further interest in collecting New Zealand stamps in general and error stamps in particular. ©

## Auction Highlights

## David Hunt

A notable thing about Auction 127 is the number of lots with crazy perfs or extra paper caused by paper folds before perforating. Some older stamps, including three from the National Parks series, are offered.

There are some curious booklet panes, too. I put lots 28 and 29 adjacent to each other to make the difference in width more obvious. How did the lot 29 pane fit in a booklet? Was the booklet cover also extra wide? Lot 30 is one of the better miscuts I've seen, and while lot 32 looks like someone took scissors to it, it is indeed the result of a paper fold.

Lot 44 has an impressive shift of the engraved black and as an added attraction also has a tagging ghost where the black should have been. I particularly like color shifts caused by misalignment of the inking roll. These shifts are not all that common, but are not usually expensive. Lot 13 is an example of one of my favorites.

In looking at dealers' stocks at shows and on the web, I have noticed that plate blocks misperfed such that the plate number is captured inside the stamp are routinely offered at $\$ 75$ and up. Our lot 82 is a nice example of this type of EFO with a very reasonable start bid.

Lot 91 is a fairly scarce item. Datz indicates 75-100 blocks have been reported, which is on the low side for catalogued errors. Lot 95 must be even scarcer. The pair and strip of six one-cent stamps with crazy perfs would be nice as mint examples but their being used on cover has to be most unusual and adds an interesting angle.

I hope I have whetted your appetite and recommend that you send in your bids as soon as possible. Remember that the earlier postmark wins in case of equal bids!

Interests of Ralph E. Trimble
I am Life Member \# LM0034 and my specialty is reentries, or double transfers, as you folks in the USA like to refer to them. I am mainly interested in BNA, but also collect USA and world re-entries.

I operate my own personal website dedicated to the study of re-entries and have over 3500 full colour close-ups of reentries from around the world. The site can be found at http://www.re-entries.com.

As well as being interested in acquiring re-entries for my own collection, I am also happy to receive 1200dpi full-stamp scans of re-entries and double transfers to post on my website. All submitters are given a credit in the form of "Courtesy of Bill Smith" with each scan that I post.

Along with virtually all of the major and important BNA re-entries on my site, I also have numerous nice USA re-entries posted, many of which have been sent to me by interested USA collectors.

While many of my earlier pages require a complete overhaul and replacement pages with better images, I am
working on this on an on-going basis as time permits. The site will never be 'finished' as there are always new and exciting finds surfacing.

I launched my site on March 1, 2002, and to date I have logged over 56,900 visitors.

## Interests of Cemil Betanov

I have two major areas of interests: newspaper wrappers and paintings on stamps.

Newspaper wrappers: I limit this to wrappers that have the indicium (i.e. stamp) printed onto the wrapper. Newspaper wrappers were used mostly until the 1940's, although some countries continued to issue them after that time. I like all wrappers with the indicium printed, but seek some more eagerly. These include:

- US wrappers, all, but in particular those with advertising printed on them or EFOs,
- Argentinean wrappers,
- Austrian wrappers, in particular those with advertisements and the pre-canceled wrappers used by the German-Austrian Alpine Society (D u Ö A V),
- Danish wrappers,
- Swiss wrappers,
- Wrappers with some kind of EFO,
- Wrappers addressed to F. Salzmann, 30 Justice, Bern, Switzerland (In case you wonder, I intend to write an article on this soon, perhaps in the AP).
If you have wrappers addressed to F. Salzmann, I am interested in acquiring them or, if this is not possible, I would very much appreciate a good quality scan.

Paintings on stamps: When I started collecting as a 10 -year old, I am not sure whether I collected stamps for their own sake or because I liked the art pictured on them. Over the years, I have spent probably as much time reading up on the art (and visiting museums) as I have spent building up my collection. I have a fairly extensive collection of art on stamps, with the following limitations:

- Stamps issued before 1990,
- Only U.S. and European countries.

I have a fairly complete collection in this area, although it will take me many years to organize it. I occasionally add to it, in particular in the area of EFOs and varieties.

## David Nye's Columbus Varieties in Linn's

We are happy to report that Linn's is featuring the varieties of the Columbian Exposition re-issue in 1992. These varieties were detected by EFOCC Member and Dealer David Nye ("Mr. Columbus") and some of them were featured in issues 163 and 164 of The EFO Collector. Linn's arranged to publish one example each month, for six months, on the same page as John Hotchner's U.S. Notes. However, Linn's online edition has additional related material that can be reached by clicking on the online edition. This is a great idea, since many of these varieties are best inspected on a screen where they can be magnified. Finally, note that varieties featured in Linn's and in The EFO Collector are different varieties.

# A Double-Page From My Album 

THE GREAT AMERICANS ISSUE

On December 27, 1980 the USPS issued the first of 63 face different intaglio engraved stamps comprising the Great Americans Issue. Over the next 19 years, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) and four contract security printers, employed 13 different printing presses and nine on and off-line perforators to produce the longest running and largest U.S. definitive issue.

High volume security printing has always produced error varieties that escape the best efforts of inspection and control intended to remove printers waste. This exhibit studies error, freak and oddity varieties resulting from the production of the sheet and booklet stamps the Great American Issue. The focus of the study is the product of unintended consequences created during the production cycle. The material exhibited was created during plate production, at the printing press, and during the perforation process.

The exhibit includes examples of every major perforation and color omission error of the Series as well as oddities caused by equipment malfunction and mishandling during the perforation process. The exhibit concludes with unused and used examples of printers waste. Many pieces displayed are unusual and by their nature, unique.

# EFOs Of The Washington/Franklin Circular Dies - Part 3 

 Bill Lehr, with assistance from Joe Pryluck $\&$ Thomas GallowaySetoff


Inked impression, reading backwards, appearing on the back side of the normal impression is almost always caused by ink transfer from the printed sheet underneath. These are interesting curios but like the under inked and over inked they have little or no value above the normal.

## Halo Effect

White (colorless) dashes, like halos, above letters or portions of the frame lines are the result of either a loose makeready or a hard roller. Either situation has the effect of splashing ink off of the printing die instead of spreading the ink. Another interesting variety with no additional value.
Ink Smear


Ink appears to have become smeared after contact with a solvent. Little or no additional value above the normal.

## Broken/Missing Letters

The letters are not actually broken. Ink build up fills in the die, resulting in whole or partial missing letters. This phenomenon is also referred to as "shallow die". The following varieties have achieved catalog listing at some time. Many other varieties exist.

## Broken/Missing Numbers/Letters in Watermark

Little bits and pieces fall off the Dandy wheel resulting in altered watermark impressions. A damaged watermark and a normal watermark are usually both present on the envelope. These freaks do not seem to have achieved catalog recognition for the circular dies. Damaged watermarks have little or no
additional value. Here are some damaged watermark varieties known to the author:

- Die 134
$19-9$, size 23 , wm 29 , white
$1-29$, size 23 , wm 29 , white
Intact 1929, broken S in US, size 23, wm 29, white
Intact 1929, broken $S$ in US, size 23 , wm 30, white, multiple stages, transforming into wm 30A?

There is some question about watermarks 28A and 30A being deliberate or accidental. The presence of both a normal $S$ and the "broken" $S$ on the same envelope is explained two different ways:

- The change in the $S$ was deliberate but some of S's were missed.
- The change in the $S$ occurred by accident, with the same piece breaking off many places.


## Oddities

## Ink Blobs/Drops/Drips



Ink drops, blobs, or spills left behind after wiping the plate can create some interesting varieties. Shown above is U431e with the "bleeding eye". Several versions of this are known with increasing amounts of "blood" coming from the eye. Other variations on this theme exist and, while amusing, have little additional value above the normal.

## Solvent Splashes

Spills, drops or splashes of cleaning solvent onto the inked die usually results in round or oval voids in the ink on the printed stamps.
Foreign Objects


Any number of foreign objects can interfere with the proper inking and printing of the stamp, or the application of the gum, or even become imbedded into the envelope itself. Typical foreign objects include lint, pieces of the cleaning rags, and even insects.

## Promoting EFOs - A Proposal For An EFO Album - Volunteers Needed

collectors to a particular branch of our hobby:
i. A ready supply of philatelic material to collect; common enough for people to find it at dealer booths, see it in auctions, and trip over is by chance,
ii. A catalog listing of what exists in the field, with some sort of comprehensible pricing structure,
iii. A specialty society to help collectors sort out the knowledge needed, and to help acquire material, and last but certainly not least,
iv. An album that makes collecting a matter of filling in the blanks.

EFOs are out there and available from dealers, collectors, and even from the Post Office, though one has to get awfully lucky to hit the jackpot with the latter source.

Catalogs are a problem. We have the Datz Errors Catalog, which is exceptional for what it is, but it is narrowly focused on the E-portion of our collecting area, compared to what is out there under the F and O categories. My listing in the Linn's Almanac, which has been updated somewhat for our own website is a decent start on a more thorough listing of the types.

We have a national society with an excellent quarterly journal that deserves wider distribution.

Finally, there is no album for EFO material, and the prospect of putting one together is daunting. If we could, I think it would have to be constructed in a way that overcomes convention. For instance, it could not include a space for every known misperf. We don't have a list of every stamp that is known misperfed. And if we did, it might well be two-thirds the size of the normal U.S. album, since most stamps do exist with their perforations off in one or another direction (sometimes both).

So we would have to approach this from a different paradigm; one that would allow adaptation to other similar situations with other categories. One idea might be to have spaces for a definitive and a commemorative example from each first class rate period (e.g. 1c, 2c, 3c, 4c, 5c, 6c, 8c, 10c, $13 \mathrm{c}, 15 \mathrm{c}, 20 \mathrm{c}$, etc. But how to take account of two-directional misperfs, misperfs on the diagonal, horizontal vs. vertical misperfs? And what of the preference of some for pairs of misperfs, or even blocks?

Virtually every category of EFO collecting offers problematic issues like this that would have to be solved. i wonder though whether we could take this on as the EFOCC, with a committee to work on it, and to see if we could define and overcome the problems. I am thinking that a complete album might be beyond us; like trying to climb Mt. Everest, when we have never before put on climbing gear.

So my proposal is that we start with the idea that we try to do pages for a category or two at a time; learning as we go, and offering our pages based on computer technology (sending by
computer, or publishing on demand). If we could generate perhaps ten pages a year, and make them available to the public as an EFOCC product, I think we could both grow the collecting of EFOs, and the EFOCC.

Of course this means that we will need a volunteer to head the effort, and a small group of half a dozen people (including at least one who is talented with computer graphics) who would work together to think out the problems and solve them, and convert the concepts agreed upon into EFOCC album pages.

And so I appeal to you the membership to ask for volunteers to work on this project. If you are interested, and/or have ideas, and we hope at least half a dozen of you do, please let me know by email to jmhstamp@verizon.net. Though I can't take on the leadership of the effort due to other commitments, I would be happy to serve on the committee because I believe this has real potential to move us a giant step into the mainstream of the hobby. ## EFOCC Auction Rules for Consignors

## Preparing Lots

Please use a blank form from a recent copy of the EFO Collector. Photocopies are fine. Please use a separate form for each lot.
Secure each lot to the front of the form; attach large lots to the reverse side. Protect all items with mounts, glassine, etc., and stiffeners, if necessary, but be sure item/items can be easily removed by Auction Director for examination and/or photographing. Do not use staples. Attach each item so that the description can be easily read. A simple and easy way to mount lots is to do so on dealer sales cards, or in glassines mounted face down for easy removal.
Include a reserve (minimum bid) or write "none". Lots may be revised to accurately describe items; or returned if necessary. Your name and EFOCC number must be on the consignment form, however, to preserve anonymity, these are removed from the consignment sheet before sending item to successful bidders.
Send consignments to David Hunt, 45 Fairway Drive, Denver, PA 17517. Use insured or registered U. S. Mail.

## Consignor Fees

Consignor commission is $10 \%$ of the hammer price, with a minimum bid of 50 cents per lot.
Unsold lots incur a 50 cent fee per lot, and the consignor pays return postage and insurance.
Expenses and printing constraints make it impractical to picture every lot, especially those which are large in size. The EFOCC will exercise discretion in picturing lots.

## Consignor Special Instructions

To save postage and labor, EFOCC can automatically re-submit unsold lots with lower minimums in a future auction, if you instruct EFOCC clearly what to do.
If you send duplicate or very similar lots, it is consignor's responsibility to state clearly if you would like to have these placed in different sales. Generally, EFOCC places all items received in the same sale to minimize paperwork.

## Consignment/Payment Timing

EFOCC receives consignments continually and prepares them for subsequent sales, roughly on a first-in/first-out basis. However, large lots may be spread over several auctions.
After the close of each sale, unsold lots are offered to bidders on a first come-first served basis for $\$ 1$ over the reserve with no buyer's commission or postage. This increases total sales, makes more bidders happy, and sells more lots for consignors, all for very little additional effort.
EFOCC needs approximately one month after auction's closing date to determine successful bidders, prepare and mail invoices, mail lots, receive payment from winners, list after sale lots and accept their offers, etc., etc. Thus, consignors can expect to receive payment about four to six weeks after an auction closes.

Bidding Precautions
Minimum bids are not estimates, but are true reserves established by the consignors. Bids below the listed reserve will not be accepted.
Bidders are responsible for inaccurate bids. Bids do not have to be typed, but, please, be sure numbers and amounts are clearly legible. Confirm phone and e-mail bids with a written bid sheet.
